

**READY, RAPID & RELIABLE FIRE ESCAPE.**

The Best, Safest and Quickest Means of Emptying School and other Dormitories in Case of Fire.

The accompanying cut exhibits the essential features of the contrivance, which may be adapted either to the interior or to the exterior of a building, but preferably to the latter, so as to create no draught for flame or smoke. *C c* represent the floor, or, as in the present diagram, platforms, which may assume the form of an ornamental balcony. These platforms are secured to the walls by suitable brackets *e e*. Two vertical shafts *f f* pass through the



floors or staging from the roof to the ground; *g g* are circular openings which alternate from one side to the other at each succeeding landing. The landing to be placed before a window at every story.

The shaft to the left of *f*, and which is secured to the next platform above (not shown in the figure), is firmly clamped, not with the hands, but with the legs and arms, and the person slides down the shaft to the next landing below, regulating with ease, by the pressure of his limbs, the rapidity of the descent.
