This blow was too much for the poor old man, thready weakened by age. The storm which will only bend down the flexible shrub, allowing it to rebound again, will break the stubborn tree. And so it was with this afflicted pair. The hasband, who had too long stubbornly refused to bow to the will of God, was now unable to bear this fearful shock, and died of a broken heart. Both, however, acknowledged that, had their precious son lived, the cup would have been tenfold more bitter; to have seen him disinherited, for whom they had sacrificed even duty, would have been anguish too deep to bear. The last words of the poor old father were, 'God has done it mercifully.' But for the lady of the hall hall, the loss of wealth could only be an additional cause of indifference to the world,—an additional incidement to love the things of heaven.
