MAINTENANCE OF FLOOR PRICE ON HOGS

Right Hon. J. G. Gardiner (Minister of Agriculture): The present floor price on hogs was set about two years ago, I think, Mr. Speaker, and when it is discontinued the government will announce the fact.

Mr. E. G. McCullough (Moose Mountain): I should like to direct to the Minister of Agriculture a question supplementary to that asked by the hon. member for Humboldt-Melfort. Can the minister state the floor price paid for hogs on the Winnipeg market?

Mr. Gardiner: The floor price for grade A hogs on the Winnipeg market is \$20.

Mr. McCullough (Moose Mountain): Then, Mr. Speaker, I should like to ask a further supplementary question. I have here a receipt—

Mr. McCullough (Moose Mountain): —dated January 3, which indicates that a price of \$18.85—

Mr. Speaker: Order. Will the hon. member be good enough to put his supplementary question?

Mr. McCullough (Moose Mountain): Yes. I should like to ask the minister whether he is aware that a price of \$18.85 is being paid for grade A hogs on the Winnipeg market?

Mr. Gardiner: I am quite satisfied no such price has been paid.
