This is a very interesting situation, Mr. Speaker. It offers some problems to the importers of raw materials from Canada. Because I feel this involves a matter of serious concern to the exporters of lumber, newsprint and other raw materials from British Columbia, I urge that this very serious question be given careful attention by the minister, that it be discussed with the appropriate authorities in the United States, and I suggest that the minister report to the house later the results of these discussions and his findings.

Proceedings on Adjournment Motion States Supreme Court to which the hon. member refers. The Canadian embassy in Washington has been asked to investigate this matter immediately. In the event that such a court decision is confirmed, we will be in a better position to decide on what course of action might be appropriate in the light of the details of the decision. Provided the decision applies equally to domestically produced raw materials it would probably not be a direct contravention of our trade agreement rights. In any case we will be anxious to ensure that Canadian export interests are protected.
