EFFECT OF CURTAILMENT OF SALMON FISHING FLEETS-FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE TO NATIVE FISHERMEN

Mr. Frank Howard (Skeena): Mr. Speaker, I would have directed this question to the Minister of Indian Affairs and Northern Development but perhaps I could direct it to the Minister of Fisheries because it relates to both departments. Is the minister aware that a number of fishing companies on the coast of British Columbia are now taking steps to curtail their salmon fishing fleets in particular for the coming year, affecting in the Prince Rupert area upward of 100 native fishermen? If he is aware of this, has his department any plans to preserve the position of the fishermen in the fishing industry?

Hon. Jack Davis (Minister of Fisheries and Forestry): Yes, Mr. Speaker, the department is aware of this problem, and alternative means of financing these fishermen have been investigated jointly with the Department of Indian Affairs and Northern Development.

Mr. Howard (Skeena): Inasmuch as this matter has been explored, can the minister provide the details to us so that the Indian people will know what is taking place?

Mr. Davis: Very briefly, Mr. Speaker, this plan is to be administered by the Indian Fishermen's Assistance Board which is already in existence in British Columbia, and the funds will be made available by the Department of Indian Affairs.
