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SPEECH FROM THE THRONE

CONTINUATION OF DEBATE ON ADDRESS IN REPLY

The House resumed consideration of the motion of Mr. Jack Burghardt for an address to his Excellency the Governor General in reply to his speech at the opening of the session; and the amendment thereto of Mr. Mulroney (p. 45).

Mr. Jack Shields (Athabasca): Mr. Speaker, continuing with my presentation on the Throne Speech, it is my contention that there is not a problem facing Canadians today that cannot be solved by reasonable men and women sitting down and coming up with a reasonable solution. Today we have approximately 4.5 million unemployed youth between the ages of 15 and 24. This represents an unemployment rate in excess of 20 per cent. In other words, one out of every five of our young people leaving universities, high schools, and trade schools faces the prospect of permanent unemployment in the present economic climate of Canada.

Mr. Deputy Speaker: Order, please. The Hon. Member for Athabasca (Mr. Shields) has the floor.

Mr. Shields: These problems exist in Canada today because of a government that has been operating in confrontation. The unemployment rate among young people is high because of confrontation between regions of the country and the federal Government. The present federal Government is unwilling to
