As we mourn today those precious lives lost one year ago, please remember our Canadian obligation to keep Canadian women and all Canadians safe from harm and free of fear.

RIDING OF CHÂTEAUGUAY

Mr. Ricardo Lopez (Châteauguay): Mr. Speaker, the riding of Châteauguay was severely affected by the Amerindian crisis last summer and, unfortunately, it is not over yet.

I want to ask the government to provide special economic assistance that will help the riding recover from the aftermath of these events.

I also want to ask the government to clarify the status of Indian land claims and give investors and the people of Châteauguay the assurance that these claims will not block the area's economic development, which badly needs a boost.

QUEBEC SOVEREIGNTY

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Hon. Jean Lapierre (Shefford): Mr. Speaker, today I rise in the House to pay tribute to a government that is helping us achieve sovereignty. The federal government is withdrawing from most areas that affect the lives of this country's citizens. It has cut postal services and railway transportation; it is making cutbacks at the CBC and privatizing Petro-Canada; it will shut off the Sarnia—Montreal pipe-line, cut back unemployment insurance and cut back regional development.

Mr. Speaker, in addition they cannot agree with the Government of Quebec on immigration. They cannot agree on occupational training, they cannot agree on regional development and they cannot agree on communications.

Mr. Speaker, initially, we said that sovereignty was desirable. Now, we realize it is necessary. And the evidence is mounting that the sooner it happens, the better.
