If you have heard of this, for the Nation has heard it, what can you expect from a private Man, but a dead Silence upon Public Affairs; a Silence, not fo much founded in an abject implicit Submiffion, as in the Public-fpirited Doubts and Fears of a Well-wifher to his Country?

But, it is poffible, that this Ignorance, which very confiderable men profess, is not the Effect of any uncommon Secrety, but of an uncommon Inanity, a total Sufpension of Measures and Councils.

The Body may be fo disjointed, that no Member can do its Office; and, what at other Times is thought to demand the United Care and Attention of the Wifeft Hands, may be now left to the Operation of Chance. There may be an Inactivity, which naturally can produce Nothing, but from f fi g a
