Hundreds of Suffragists Rode or Marched in a Demonstration For the Cause of Universal Suffrage, and Fifth Avenue Was Packed With Cheering Spectators.

NEW YORK, May 4 .- (Special.)-Women on horse back, led by Miss Inez Mulholland, and preceded by a formidable escort of police, pranced up Fifth avenue Saturday afternoon from Washington square ahead of the greatest and most impressive votes for women parade this country has ever known. Hundreds of organizations sent women, young and old, in uniform, to add to the demonstration for the cause of universal suffrage. Bands made the avenue vibrate with music, crowds along the sidewalks cheered either in approval or good car was shunted to the Bay street nature. TOKIO, Japan, May 3.—(Copyright)—The navy department has contracted for three battleships of 30,500 tons each, to be built in Japan. They will be sister ships to the Fuso, now building in the naval dockyards at Kure.

Very little is definitely known of the Fuso, but it is supposed that her armor, in accordance with the Japanese practice since the Russian war, will consist of a moderately heavy belt, probably 10 inches thick, extending over nearly her entire length, and carried clear up to the main deck.

The ship is designed, according to report, for a speed of 27 knots.

CREATE A METROPOLITAN DISTRICT.

Report Abroad in Ottawa That' Opposition Members Will Insist on Speaking Until Ejected, Whereupon All Liberals Will Withdraw-Buchanan and Carvell to Play Leading Roles.

OTTAWA, May 4 .- (Special.) -- Sensational rumors afloat tonight lend color to the persistent report that parliament will be prorogued before Victoria Day. These are to the effect that the Liberal members, headed by Sir Wilfrid Laurier, will walk out of the chamber and remain away for the balance of the session in case the naval bill is put thru the house, as undoubtedly it will be, by the application of the closure rule.

The plan is for the opposition to disregard the two o'clock rule, terminating all debate upon motion of the government. Some Liberal member, it is said, will insist upon speaking until he is named by Mr. Speaker, and removed from the chamber. Then some other patriot will step into the breach to invite and receive similar treatment. 
