The Union Stock Yards have also had a most successful year and have received 21,068 cars of stock during 1913. The previous year the receipts were only 15,849 cars.


Lakeview Lodge, No. 272, I.O.O.F., held a well attended meeting for the installation of officers in St. James Hall last night. A number of new members were initiated.

## NO ADDITIONS TO BRAMPTON LIST

Voters to Remain as Revised by Clerk—Injunction Granted Yesterday.

## MIDDLETON'S DECISION

County Judge Must Revise Only—Cannot Reopen List to Add to It.

Brampton local option fight started in earnest at Osgoode Hall yesterday, when the local option party applied to Mr. Justice Middleton for an order restraining County Judge McEgibbon from adding names to the list of those qualified to vote on local option in Brampton on Monday.

The voters' list had already been revised the year and those opposing the bylaw voted to have the new names added, and Judge McEgibbon granted the request. Mr. Justice Middleton, however, holds that the county judge has no power to reopen the voters' list and add new names, but must revise the list as submitted by the clerk. The judgment is as follows:

Judgment: This motion, unavailingly made at a late hour, must be determined at once or no good purpose can be served. Under the new provisions found in the municipal act the intention is to give finally to the voters' lists and at the same time to allow the necessary amendments to be made up to the last possible moment, so that the exact list of those entitled to vote upon a bylaw may be ascertained before the voting takes place. The list to be certified is to be based upon the last revised voters' list "omitting" persons whose names are entered on such voters' list but are not entitled to vote on the bylaw.

When the action of the clerk is completed it may be reviewed by the judge, who may strike out the name of any person wrongly entered on the list, i.e., which the clerk should not have included in or of any person who is shown to be dead, but the whole question of the right to be on the revised voters' list is not opened up; the names of those entitled to appear by the last revised voters' list to vote on the bylaw must remain the list. The judge may add "the name of any person who may have been wrongly omitted from the list," i.e., the name of any person who by the revised voters' list appears entitled to vote on the bylaw, and whose name ought to have been included by the clerk in his list. There is no warrant for the addition of names improperly omitted from the revised voters' list. The function of the judge is in this respect limited. It is not improper for the clerk's action to the correction of the voters' list, but he has no right to vote on the bylaw. ## EARLSCOURT.

Real estate men in the St. Clair and Earlscourt district are optimistic regarding the future of building activity and the buying of land has ceased since last summer. McLean and Smith, in an interview with "The World" yesterday, stated that J. Taylor will build two solid brick stores three stories high on St. Clair avenue, north side, 500 feet west from Dufferin street. There is very little vacant land now left for building purposes on the north side of St. Clair avenue, between St. Clair and Dufferin streets, and the price asked by the owners is \$225 per foot.

James Manchester will shortly get out excavations for three large stores on the southwest corner of St. Clair avenue and Elmwood avenue, to cost \$25,000. On the south side of St. Clair avenue, between Elmwood avenue and Dufferin street, \$190,000, and \$180 per foot has been offered and refused for a piece with a frontage of fifty feet in this section.

A license has been granted to Harry Reader of the Toronto Stationery Co. for a moving picture theatre, and excavation is under way for the building. It is situated on the south side of St. Clair avenue between Elmwood avenue and Dufferin street, and will be the largest moving picture theatre in the district.

J. T. Smith, St. Clair avenue, who has secured the contract for the building, expects to have it completed in April.

The civic authorities are at present removing the cars, fixtures, etc., of the St. Clair avenue line from Station road, where they have been laid since the opening of the line, to the new barns at Broadwood, which are nearing completion. Work is being pushed forward on the Morrison avenue line sewer. It is now completed to Boon avenue.

## MIMICO MAY GET HAVE AN ELECTION

H. B. Stewart, Who Withdrew at Nomination, Came Back Day After.

IS NOW A CANDIDATE Cites Similar Case at City Elections—May Upset Acclamation.

Although Clerk Jackson yesterday announced that Messrs. West, Clarke, Heather and Coulton were elected to the council for the present year by acclamation, it is not at all unlikely that the village will yet have to go to an election for the councillors, as well as for the reevehip.

Nominated as councillor at the nomination meeting yesterday was H. B. Stewart, proprietor of the largest general store in the village, stated in his nomination address that he did not feel his business interests would allow him to accept the nomination. He stood for election, he filed his qualification papers with the clerk, well within the allotted twenty-four hours.

Popular Candidates As Mr. Stewart is one of the most influential business men in the village, he is likely to have received a big vote in the election. Decided to Run. The day after nomination he visited the clerk and stated that he was standing for election and to print ballots accordingly. The clerk, after receiving protests from the other candidates, sought legal advice, which he states, is to the effect that the village is not now bound to have the councillors elected. Stewart has been advised, which is to the effect that he should stand for election, but he can still stand and force the other candidates to a vote of the ratepayers.

Asks Fair Play. "Legally and in the ordinary ethics of fair play I am within my rights in asking for the council of Mimico for the ensuing year," stated Mr. Stewart yesterday. "My supporters urge me, if my candidature is not accepted, to upset the election by a bylaw which I will most certainly do if necessary."

Similar Case. "The question is similar to the incident in which Fred G. McEgibbon, the Mayor of Mimico, refused to sign a bylaw in the city hall a week ago Tuesday, but of which he declared in order, and Stewart yesterday in supporting this claim.

If the desire was general to make Mr. Barker third deputy reeve he would retire.

Endorsed Barker. P. Peddie did not want to be a candidate, and W. Jennings also declined, stating that as president of the Cedarvale Ratepayers' Association he was there to endorse Mr. Barker.

The names of Mr. Crosby and Mr. Barker were on the ballot, and Mr. Barker was elected by a majority of one vote. Geo. Moses, Jr., occupied the chair.
