### AUSTRIANS HOLD **ITALIANS BACK**

THESDAY MORNING

Brutal Treatment of Women and Children is Alleged

CLASH IS CONFIRMED

Alpine Patrol in Conflict With Austrians on Frontier

ROME. May 24.—Austrian troops have torn up a section of the track of the railroad running between Vosino and Malberghetto, dynamiting one bright over the Adige and destroying another by shell fire. according to a special despatch from Verona.

The Austrians have retired behind their fortifications on the frontier of Trent. Forty thousand Tyrolean, Ruthenian, and Bohemian troops have arrived at Trent. The police of that city are said to have arrested forty persons of pro-Italian sympathies. Twenty others, including two priests, have been taken into custody at Roverto. Signor DeBiasa, an Italian who formerly was a member of the Austrian Parliament, and his brother were arrested at Ala in the Austrian Tyrol, and sent to Bohemia as host-

Bishop Will Stay.

The Bishop of Trent has declared he will remain in the city as long as a single building remains standing. single building remains standing.

The mountains along the frontier from Val Adige to Val Sugana are swarming with Austrian soldiers. The frontier line has been outlined with an elaborate system of barbed wire entanglements thru which electric currents can be passed.

The city hall at Avis, near Ala, has been destroped, but the family of the mayor escaped across the frontier.

The report of a clash between invading Austrians and ah Alpine patrol has been confirmed.

Children Succumbed.

A trainload of Italians arriving at Cormons, near Goritz, are reported to have been driven into a field by Austriah gendarmes, where they were

Several children are said to have died because of this experience. The women and children were permitted to cross into Italian territory the next day, but all the men were detained.

The Austrian frontier in the Trentino has been evacuated by the civilian population, the gendarmes and the forest keepers. The frontier patrols have fallen back along a line running near Ala, where the Austrians are reported concentrating. Civilians were ordered to remain indoors while Austrian troops marched thru Trent Sunday.

### **BIG GERMAN FORCE** ON ITALIAN BORDER

Austrians Reported to Make Up Less Than Third of Number

CHECK ON SUPPLIES

Germany Will Feel Pinch in More Than One Respect

THE HAGUE (via London), May 14—From information reaching The Hague it is understood that the Germans and Austrians have concen-trated approximately 680,000 men on the Italian frontier. They have ocoupled strategic positions in order to meet an attack or to attempt to strike the first heavy blow in an endeavor to dishearten the new combatants at

the beginning of the campaign.

The Germans constitute the larger part of this force, which is made up of 34 divisions of approximately 20,000 men each. Only ten of these divisions are Austrians.

German and Austrian diplomats here are apparently not perturbed by the entry into the war of a new antagonist. It is pointed out in other quarters, however, that Italy's de-cision may have the effect of curtailing Germany's supplies, large quanti-tles of which hitherto reached Germany by way of Italy and Switzer-

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
