Armament is deprived of the Power of aeting; Yet we have almost the whole Foree of Canada to oppose.—In this situation, there is such a Choice of Difficultys, that I own myself at a Loss how to determine. The Affaires of Great Britain, I know, require the most vigorous Measures; But then the Courage of a Handfull of brave Men should be exerted, only where there is some Hope of a favourable Event. However you may be assured, Sir, that the small part of the Campaign which remains, shall be employ'd (as far as I am able) for the Honour of His Majesty & the Interest of the Nation, In which I am sure of being well seconded by the Admiral & by the Generals. Happy, if our Efforts here ean contribute to the Success of His Majesty's Arms in any othe: Parts of America.
