tude to benefactors, fidelity to friends. But tell him of the *favours* conferred by one nation on another, or of the *moral* obligations fubfifting between them, and he would laugh at your ignorance. Intereft, he would inform you, is the *foul* of all public bodies; the fervice theylrender others is merely with a view to their *own* advantage; it is the *generoficy* of an ufurer, and deferves no better return,

Policy, therefore, fhould influence the determination of public measures; whatever tends to the advantage of the community, should be accounted just; and whatever is expedient must confequently be right. Thus then let it be between England and America; if the haughty Britons call us unjust and ungrateful, let us retort on them the charge of tyranny and oppreffion; if they fligmatize our caufe with the odious name of rebellion. let us pronounce it a noble ftruggle for liberty: if policy authorizes the continuance of the war, it is glorious; it must be right to persevere; and if fortune crowns our efforts with fuccess, we will be content to leave them the confolation of calling us ungrateful rebels, if at the fame time they are obliged to acknowledge us free and independent Americans.

Such have been the fentiments maintained by the majority in Congress, from the commence-F 3 ment
