A. S. LANGLOIS DEAD

Prominent Cornwall Barrister Succumbed to Cerebral Hemorrhage.

COINWALL, Oct. 1.—(Special.)—Alexander Sandfield Langlois, barrister, died this morning at the Hotel Dieu after ten days' illness, following a cerebral hemorrhage. Deceased was the son of the late Jean Langlois, K.C., Quebec, who for 12 years sat as a Commissioner for the County of Montmorency in the Dominion parliament, and a grandson of the late Hon. John Sandfield Macdonald, premier of Ontario.

Mr. Langlois was well-known in Toronto, and had many friends. He was a member of the editorial staff of The World about ten years ago.
