

# Temporary Lull In Mining Markets—Values About Steady

## Market Tightens Up a Trifle But Undertone is Still Easy

Porcupine Issues Halted by Lethargic Demand, and Some Further Uncertainty is Shown in Special Instances.

World Office, Nov. 22.—The mining market today was a trifle tighter than yesterday, but the undertone was still easy. The market was affected by a slight lull in the local mining exchanges to-day, a slightly improved tendency being observable in most instances.

## DOME EXTENSION SHAFT AT 180 FOOT LEVEL

Cross-Cuts to Be Run at 200 Foot Depth—Dome Mill Progresses Rapidly.

PORCUPINE, Nov. 22.—The main shaft on the Dome Extension has reached a depth of 180 feet, and as the sinking is being done by day and night shifts, the remaining 20 feet to the 200-foot level will be driven in the near future.

From the 200-foot level the cross-cut will be sent north to intersect the Anchor vein and will be continued north through the interesting mineralized zone to cut two more veins that lie a little further to the north.

The main shaft was sunk in country rock about 30 feet from the Anchor vein, the object being to have the collar of the shaft in high ground so as to keep out surface water.

There was no expectation of encountering any values until the cross-cut was run, but a quartz stringer carrying native gold has come in to the shaft at depth. This may indicate that the Anchor vein has widened at depth, and if so it will be found to be an extensive ore body, as the shaft is fully 30 feet away from the vein as it outcrops at the surface.

The big dome mill is progressing fast, and it looks as if the stamps will be dropping on schedule time, Jan. 15.
