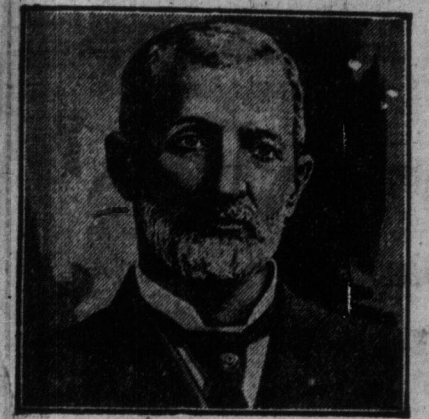

BIG THING IN NORTH'S RAIL'Y

What Will North Toronto Council Do About Metropolitan?
—Intense Interest Over the Question.

NORTH TORONTO, April 12.—(Special.)—A member of the town council who has several years' experience in municipal life, discussing the pending negotiations between council and the Metropolitan Railway Company over the double tracking of Yonge-street, said to-day: "I believe that an agreement will be reached whereby the work can be undertaken, or, at least, submitted to the people for their ratification or rejection, and that in the near future." He was in favor of an agreement being reached, but opposed the immediate prosecution of the work on account of the presence of the sewer so recently put down.

His Worship Mayor Brown, when spoken to last night on the matter, thought that the deal would go thru, as the railway company were evincing a disposition to treat with the town on something like a reasonable basis. "However, it is too soon to say anything definite," he declared, "because nothing definite has been done. The people will have the say anyway in the last analysis," he said.

One or two members of council who are strongly pledged to municipal ownership are known to be adverse to taking up the matter at all pending some action by the city on that division of the line between Merton-street and down to the C.P.R. tracks. Anything the town might do any arrangement they might enter into with the Metropolitan Railway could only have to do with that portion immediately north of the old Belt Line, and a double track thru the town, which would not extend right thru would, it is pointed out, only congest traffic worse than ever.

"The only solution is to go into this question with the city," said a member of the North Toronto Council to-day, "and I for one will refuse to allow the town to be used as a club by the Metropolitan to further its own interests."

It will be of interest to North Toronto people to know that in addition to the 500 Norway maple trees ordered to the representative of the company, furnishing them has agreed to allow private citizens to obtain a supply at the reduced figures obtained—50c a tree. While the town will go as far as they can on the side streets, private citizens sending in their order to Mr. Norman, town clerk, will get them at that rate quoted, and if at the end of three years the trees are found to be living and thrifty the amount paid will be refunded by the town.

However, as all arrangements for the trip were complete it was thought best to proceed, as Mr. and Mrs. Reid have already been around the world a couple of times. The trip will occupy between five and six months, as some time will be spent in Cape Town, S.A., where Mrs. Reid has a brother. The attention of townspeople is directed to the public meeting called by the Ratepayers' Association in the town hall on Saturday evening. The date to be held will be the topic. 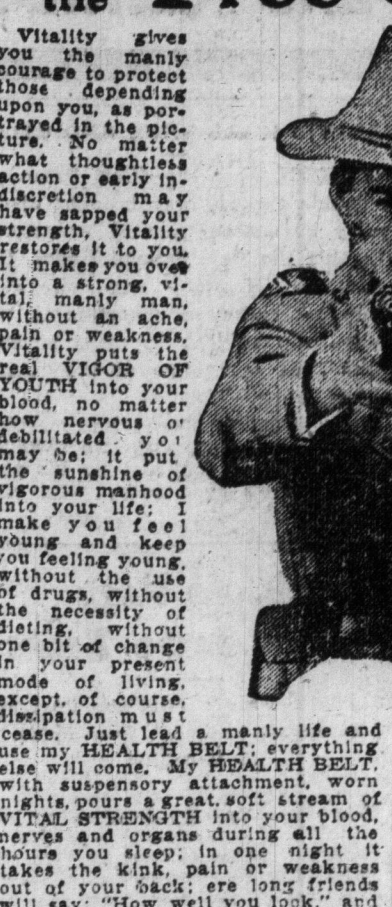
