

ANNA EVA FAY AT HAMILTON

Also Prophecies That Pense Will Win

HURRY WORK ON G. T. P.
BOTH IN EAST AND WEST

Engineering Difficulties at First
Expected Are Being Discoun-
ted Now.

Montreal, Jan. 12.—(Special.)—It now looks as if the commissioners would soon place the first section of the government portion of the Grand Trunk Pacific under contract. It was in fact, stated to-day that tenders would be asked within a fortnight for the 275 mile section between Winnipeg and Lake Superior Junction. Chairman Parent and his colleagues do not seem to express any desire to assist in the realization of Mr. Morse's dream of an uninterrupted line of G. T. P. rails from Lake Superior to the Saskatchewan by the early fall of 1907, and things have been hastened. It is likewise understood that the final section will be shorter by perhaps ten miles than was supposed when the G. T. P.'s own engineers laid out the line under the then chief engineer, Stevens. Contrary to general belief, a great portion of the line will be far from difficult. The first hundred miles east of Winnipeg is of the easiest possible character, and the same cannot be said of the other portion. The remaining portion up to Lake Superior Junction will be very heavy, although good grades have been secured. Favorable news has been also received from the section now being built from Port Arthur to the main line. Foley and Berthele, the contractors, have already got 300 men or more at work in the rock cuttings. A gentleman who came down from Ottawa to-day said he had heard that some 200 additional miles of the government section would be at once put under contract in the east. It appears certain that by May 1 the G. T. P. from Lake Superior to Edmonton, a distance of about 1200 miles, will be in the hands of the contractors and well covered with men and teams.

MUST RETAIN COAL DUTIES
ARGUMENTS OF NOVA SCOTIA

Cannot Otherwise Hope to Success-
fully Compete With the
U. S. Product.

Sydney, N.B., Jan. 12.—(Special.)—
The tariff commission began its ses-
sion here this morning.

Harvey Graham of the Nova Scotia
Steel and Coal Company, and Alexander
Ecky, Dominion Coal Company, re-
ferred to the importance of the coal in-
dustry to Nova Scotia. For the year
ending Sept. 30, 1904, there was a total
output of 5,247,135 tons. Mining gave em-
ployment to 11,650 persons. Royalty paid
the government was \$417,648. The total
production in Cape Breton Island was
2,831,822 tons. The total sales to the
Province of Quebec in 1904 were 1,730,
248 tons. Shipments would be about the
same this year.

Coal companies in Cape Breton, owing
to long rail haul and position in
mainland, are vitally dependent on the
St. Lawrence market, which includes
Montreal and points west. Competition
at those points with both American
and English coal has been keenly felt.
It was therefore absolutely necessary
that the present duty of sixty cents
per gross ton on bituminous coal be
maintained. Without this the produc-
tion would be reduced one half. Ex-
ports of coal from Nova Scotia to the
United States consisted almost wholly
of slack coal, on which there was a
duty of 15 cents; other grades were
practically shut out of the New Eng-
land market by a duty of sixty-seven
cents. Persistent efforts made during
the past four years to find foreign
markets had not resulted in regular
business. Efforts had been made to
find markets west of Montreal, but owing
to keen competition with American
coal, with the total sales to it had
been found impossible to establish a
trade.

E. S. Cameron, on behalf of the Domi-
nion Iron and Steel Company, asked
for a continuance of the bounty
system and for duty on barbed and
galvanized wire. General Manager F.
F. Jones said that the dumping clause
was the best measure devised in the
interests of Canada.

John Moffatt, grand secretary of
Provincial Workmen's Association, on
behalf of miners in Nova Scotia, said
the F.W.A. was opposed to any inter-
ference with the coal duties, and re-
solved to that effect. Any change
in existing conditions, he said, would
result disastrously to the Nova Scotia
coal industry.

The Radial Railway will build a
tower on each side of the canal at the
back of the city of Toronto. The line
now passes under the water. The com-
pany will start double-tracking and claim-
ing to convey its power line across the
foundation of the Bank of Hamilton
building, it is necessary to raise the
foundations by means of 400 jacks, and
to install steel girders 10 feet long
under the water before the build-
ing's stonework is added to the build-
ing. Architect Charles Mills has
charge.

Some of the aldermen are in favor
of compelling the street railway to lay
down its power lines over the water.

FIRST DECISIONS ADVERSE.

Judge Decides Against Contentions
of Gaynor and Greene.

Savannah, Ga., Jan. 12.—There were
two important developments in the
trial of Greene and Gaynor case to-
day. On the first day of the trial, the
judge spoke on the pleas of the de-
fendants to the jurisdiction of the
court, the order of the court was
in favor of the demurrers of the de-
fendants to indictment 371.

The grounds of the demurrer were
that the indictment was not found
within three years after the commis-
sion of the alleged offence, and
that it failed to specify how the de-
fendants had absented themselves from the
jurisdiction of the court when they
were in New York; that the indictment
alleged that the work in the harbor did
not comply with the specifications, but
did not particularize wherein it was
inferior, and that the statute upon
which the indictment was predicated
was unconstitutional in that it made
penal a fraud against the United
States.

CHINESE DELEGATION ARRIVES.

San Francisco, Cal., Jan. 12.—The
Siberian Siberia arrived to-day from
the Orient, having on board the dele-
gation of Chinese, headed by the
Tuan-fang, and Tai Hung Tzeu, with their
subordinates and suite, sixty-two per-
sons in all, who will study the politi-
cal and social institutions of the United
States and Europe.

Heading the reception committee was
Prof. W. J. Jenks of Cornell Universi-
ty, who came here as the personal rep-
resentative of President Roosevelt.
