SIREN AT PT. DALHOUSIE GREAT AID TO MARINERS

Will Be in Position by July—Corruna, With Iron Cargo From England, Here Thursday.

Shipping men are praising the action of the Dominion government in supplying the long-felt need of a fog-siren at Port Dalhousie. The siren is to be erected on the eastern pier and will be worked by compressed air, driven by an electric motor. The work of installation is to be completed by July.

The Corruna of the Canadian Lake Line, which is bringing a cargo of pig-iron direct from England, will arrive in Toronto early on Thursday.

Turbine Steamship Company officials deny that the delay to the Turbinia is due to trouble with her engines or that it is likely to be prolonged. They allege that she is being held at Hamilton for American inspection and that the company is taking advantage of the delay to effect some small repairs. They expect her to go on her route on Thursday.

The steamship Dundung of the Merchants' Line was in port yesterday morning from Montreal. She sailed for Hamilton later in the day, and will be in Toronto early on Thursday.

The new steamer Rapid King, which had her preliminary trial on the lake last week, will go into commission within a few days. She will be used in conveying passengers per the R. & O. steamers thru the St. Lawrence Rapids.

The Canadian Shipbuilding Co. report that the two cargo steamers which they have under construction at their Niagara yards are almost completed. They are being built for the St. Lawrence & Chicago Steam Navigation Co. and the Hamilton & Fort William Navigation Co.

Work is also being rushed on a large car ferry at the Toronto Works. It will be used by the Ontario Car Ferry Co. between Cobourg and Charlotte and will likely go into commission early this summer.

The passenger boat for the Muskoka Navigation Co. is being built on the wharf at Muskoka. She will be used on the Bals route.

OPPOSITION LEADER SPEAKS.

Both Parties Have Views in Common Re Subsidy.

OTTAWA, May 21.—(Special.)—J. A. Macdonald, leader of the Liberal opposition in the British Columbia legislature, is in the city.

Interviewed regarding the claims of the province for a large federal subsidy, he replied that the two parties had some views in common on that subject. Both parties had always contended for larger federal subsidy. As to the methods employed by the premier to get an increase he would not comment.

Mr. Macdonald affirmed that the present state of prosperity surpassed that of any previous period in the history of British Columbia. He attributes this to the big price of copper and other metals and to the exceptional demand for lumber in the northwest and all over the world.

Besides the fruit growing industry had received a wonderful impetus lately.

HOSPITALS FULL OF RIOTERS.

Following Odessa Outbreak, Police Let "Black Hundred" Loose.

ODESSA, May 21.—Fifty-three persons were taken to the hospitals suffering from broken heads or limbs, or otherwise dangerously injured as a result of the outbreak of the Black Hundred here yesterday, following the assassination of three police officers.

In addition about a hundred persons were less seriously injured. The victims included women, children and students.

It is alleged that, out of revenge for the assassination of the three officers, whom the Jews had nicknamed the "heroes of the anti-Jewish riots," the police turned the Black Hundreds loose, armed with clubs and rubber sticks.

Jewish pedestrians were brutally beaten and many houses in the Jewish quarters were looted and their occupants assaulted. Disorder lasted for some hours, the police making no attempt to suppress it.

Barbaric outrages are expected.

DOCTORS IN POLICE STATIONS.

Bill Will be Offered for Appointment of Physicians.

NEW YORK, May 21.—Following an autopsy performed on the body of Dr. Charles A. Foster, who was found dead in a police cell, announcement was made that death was due to uremia, and heart trouble.

Dr. Foster was in the station, charged with intoxication.

The coroner declares that he will immediately offer a bill in the state legislature calling for the placing of physicians at various police stations to examine all men and women charged with intoxication.
