Special Instrument Purchased.

"Early in 1897 the Meteorological Department received a letter from the chairman of the Seismological Committee of the British Association asking the Toronto Observatory to purchase an instrument. The honorable the Minister approved and the seismograph arrived in Toronto the morn-

Some of the Records.

"Since starting the instrument we have recorded eleven very decided quakes and nine small earth tremors; many others may have been lost in the air current disturbances. The most marked of the eleven was the first, which occurred in Borneo; the next in order of importance occurred on Dec. 19. When earthquakes were reported both from Bermuda and Italy. Next came one on Dec. 28 and was followed by a larger one on the 29th, and both were also recorded by Prof. Milne on the isle of Wight. "An important series of shocks was registered on Jan. 17, beginning at 12.25,355 a.m. Earth tremors were recorded Jan. 19 at 8 p.m., Jan. 20 at 5.40 p.m., and Jan. 24, beginning at 7.15 p.m., and this latter was particularly well marked, but as yet I have not learned where the carthquake in Asia Minor a week ago occurred during a violent air tremor storm, and, while I am nearly certain our instrument was affected, I cannot state it positively."


