The Canadian Pacific Railway, by giving a rate of 12½ cents from Fort William to Winnipeg (present rate being 16 cents), can meet the conditions that exist; and a \$2 import duty would enable the Outario mills situated on the Georgian Bay wills, without entailing burdens upon the sextlers, who would get their lumber at even less than present prices; and the Georgian Bay mills being free from association entanglements, a healthy competition for the benefit of Manitoba would always exist.

If the Government, of which you are a distinguished member, will grant the petition of the lumbermen for an import duty I have assurance that the management of the Canadian Pacific Railway will gladly act in concert, as it certainly will be to their advantage to have an additional quantity of lumber transported over their line. And so far as the railroad is concerned, I would say that not only would they derive the advantage of having a west-bound traffic for their empty cars, even though it was carried without profit, but if the farmers in Manitoba had more numerous granaries and barns there would not be so great a rush to remove the crop immediately after harvest. Not only is the Canadian lumberman injured—by having his local market in the western portion of Ontario destroyed, but we are also suffering to a considerable extent through the importation of Southern pitch pine, railroad ties, etc., into the Quebee market, Southern pine being used where Canadian red pine, of equal strength and durability, can be supplied.

The Value of Laior.


