THE FRENCH SHORE QUESTION

Frenchmen Were Obstinate, But Mr. Chamberlain Advises Renewal of the English mail steamer yesterday despatches from Colonial Secretary Chamberlain telling of his efforts toward a settlement of the French shore question and why a renewal of the modus vivendi is necessary. He offered the French various concessions in fishing if they would abandon their interference with the industrial development of the treaty coast.
