Liverpool Wheat Futures Lower.—General Markets, Notes and Comment. World Office. Friday Evening, Nov. 21. Liverpool wheat futures closed 1/4 to 1/2 lower today than on Thursday and corn futures 1/4 to 1/2 higher.

An estimate of the world's wheat crop compiled by the Russian Minister of Agriculture, gives the crop of exporting countries at 2,021,475,700 bushels, compared with 2,018,225,707 bushels in 1901. In importing countries the yield was 888,674,021 bushels, an increase of almost 80,000,000 bushels over 1901. The aggregate world's crop is 2,909,149,721 or 28,000,000 bushels in excess of last year.
