CONSUMPTIVE WORKMEN.

Important Step Taken by Friendly Societies in Great Britain.

Berlin, Nov. 21.—When Dr. Alfred Hiller, was over here attending the International Conference on Tuberculosis he made the suggestion that representatives from the great English friendly societies should come over to Germany and inspect the Beelitz and other consumption sanitaria.

No time has been lost in carrying this suggestion into effect. It is understood that Sir William Broadbent, Dr. Alfred Hiller, Mr. Malcolm Morris and Dr. Weatherly were members of a deputation that placed this proposal before the British benefit societies, with the result that representatives from these institutions will shortly visit his country.

In addition to inspecting the sanitaria they will see how the state sick insurance fund is administered for the benefit or workmen.

In Germany insurance is compulsory, and the workmen have to contribute from their pay a certain percentage, while the masters add an equal amount.
