> Went Ashore at the Spot Where the Moravian Was Lost.

She Had 160,000 Bushels of Wheat on Board Which Swelled and Burstthe Holds-Experience of a Clergy man Who Was a Passenger.

Halifax, March 14.-The wrecked steamer Castilian is going to pieces rapidly on the ledges of Gannet Rock. where she struck in the thick fog on Sunday morning. The grain, of which she had 160,000 bushels on board, swelled her forward holds, and that part of the ship burst, the water washing in and out, carrying the grain into the sea. Some 200 cattle were drowned in the hold. There is now no hope whatever of saving the ship, although a great deal of her cargo may be secured. A strong gale during the night helped the work which was begun when the Castilian struck. number of steam tugs and sailing vessels are at the wreck picking up what

cargo they can. Eleven saloon passengers from the Castilian arrived here yesterday. remainder of the passengers, including all the second-class and steerage, will arrive tonight in time to catch the mail steamer Vancouver, sailing for

Liverpool. Capt. Barret and the first and second officers remained with the wrecked steamer at Gannet Rock. No official explanation has yet been given as to the cause of the disaster.

FULL OF WATER. A steamer just back from the wreck reports that the Castilian has settled down, and is now full of water at high She is breaking in two at the saloon. Capt. Barret secured the ship's papers, cabin plate, etc. The steamer is a total loss, and the cargo is badly damaged.

A CHEERFUL SPIRIT.

The shipwrecked people are warmly praising the conduct of Miss Maud Hendrie, of Hamilton, Ont., who was the life of the first cabin party, and by her merry entertaining sociability contributed a great deal to keeping the people in good cheer during the long hours spent on the unfortunate ship. Miss Hendrie filled in part of the time by taking photographs of scenes on the steamer and of Gannet One of the pictures shows a group of passengers wearing life-belts. REV. MR. MORRISON'S EXPERI-ENCE.

Rev. Mr. Morrison tells some of his experiences in the disaster, as follows: "I was in bed when the Castilian struck, having retired early, and, somewhat restless, slept rather lightly. felt the steamer grinding on the ledge when she met the rocks, and looking at my watch saw it was 3:30 a.m. went on deck, and on being told to keep cool, returned to my room, where soon we received word that everybody was to dress. It was said on board that the accident was due to the ship's compasses having been affected. There was no sign of a panic, but when the afternoon came and began to lengthen without any sign of help coming from shore, misgivings manifested them-selves. The order had just been given to lower the boats for the departure of the cabin passengers, when whistles were heard of steam tugs coming to the rescue. This ended whatever fears were beginning to rise, and it was only a matter of time before we were safely housed in Yarmouth."

NO CONFUSION.

It was 3:40 Sunday morning when the Castilian struck. There was no confusion, and all orders were obeyed with coolness and promptness. About 5 o'clock Chief Officer McAffrey and Purser Stewart were dispatched to convey the news to land. At Tusel Wedge they communicated with the local agents of the Allan line, and had tugs sent to the scene as quickly as




