Defective Board Walks Swamp City With Suits

Engineer Graydon Asks That the Walks Be Torn Up—Some Cases in Point.

The city of London is finding itself in a pretty pickle these days as the result of actions arising through alleged defective sidewalks. Suit after suit is being threatened against the corporation, and in most cases the city is compelled to settle rather than fight the actions in the courts. Where the money is to come from to pay the shot nobody appears to know.

At the meeting of the board of works last night City Engineer Graydon recommended that the city settle the claim of Mrs. McCurdy, of 77 Wellington road, who is said to have been injured through an alleged defective walk.

Mr. Graydon drew attention to the number of suits being brought against the city by people who suffer injuries through the plank walks. He recommended that all such walks in the city be torn up.

"You may look at them today and they will be all right. Tomorrow they will be found absolutely dangerous," Mr. Graydon said.

Claim Settled.

The mayor reported that he had settled the Cochrane case for \$200. He had tried to settle with Mrs. Kerr, who was injured on a walk in East London, but she refused the \$35 offered, and at the assizes was given \$900 and costs. "We are responsible for the condition of the sidewalks," Ald. Saunders said, "and yet we must wait until the people are ready to replace the old walks."

"No," Mayor Judd corrected. "The council by a two-thirds vote may put down a walk anywhere."

"Then we should replace every dangerous walk in the city," Ald. Saunders declared.

The city engineer's recommendation re the McCurdy claim was accepted. The protest of Wm. G. Parsons against a drain on High street being used for sewage purposes was referred to the board of health.

Closing King Street.

The question of the closing of a portion of the west end of King street for the London Foundry Company was discussed and laid on the table. The city solicitor may be consulted.

The mayor said that he did not think the city has the power to close a portion of the street. As the company has already built on the property his workshop thought the best way out of the matter would be to not attempt to close any portion of the thoroughfare by resolution of the council, but to allow matters to remain as they are.

A deputation waited on the board and asked for a sewer on Tecumseh avenue. A number of houses have been put up on the street on the un-

derstanding that the sewer would be constructed this year, but at its last meeting the board recommended that no sewer be put down. This recommendation passed the council.

The hearing the deputation, decided to recommend that the decision of the last meeting be reconsidered, and that the sewer be built.

It seems that a petition against the sewer and which was sufficiently signed was lodged with the city clerk, but it was two days late, and consequently has no weight with the city.

The cost of the sewer, with side drains, will be about \$2,500. It is to be built on the local improvement plan.

Is Material All Right?

York street west ratepayers appeared in a body to protest against the class of concrete being used by the Forest City Paving Company. They claimed that the contractors are not using sufficient cement.

Inspector Dando, who was present, said that already 248 barrels of cement had been used. The gravel, which had also been criticised, he considered first-class.

City Engineer Graydon said the cause of the trouble was the driving of teamsters over the concrete before it had properly set.

To Ald. Saunders, Mr. Dando said that some of the teamsters were in the employ of the Forest City Paving Company.

"The contractors do not appear to care how the job is done so long as they get through with it," Ald. Saunders said. "If they allow teams to drive over the concrete before it has set the city should not suffer by their carelessness. It's an outrage that it is necessary for the people to come here with a complaint of this character. We expect that our inspectors will see that the work is done properly. If they don't I suppose it's up to the committee to put down the pavement and trust to no one."

Unsatisfactory Job.

Ald. Garratt declared the pavement to be an unsatisfactory job.

Chairman Gerry said he didn't think there was enough cement in the concrete.

Ald. Saunders claimed the machine mixer does not turn out as good concrete as that mixed by hand.

"All we know about the pavement," said a member of the committee, "is that you can kick stones out of the concrete, which appears to be lacking in cement."

"Harring a few soft places, the pavement is all right," said the city engineer. "These soft spots will all be cut out."

On motion of Ald. Saunders the committee decided to inspect the pavement this morning.

The committee agreed to give the Forest City Paving Company \$50 in full of all claims, and to have the asphalt filler changed to a cement filler. By so doing the possibility of trouble with the property owners is obviated, and the sum of \$333.60 on the cost of the pavement is saved to the people.

BANK-WRECKER NEARS NEW YORK

A Race to Get Possession of Paul O. Stensland When He Lands.

New York, Sept. 20.—Paul O. Stensland, the president of the Milwaukee avenue wrecked state bank of Chicago, who was caught in Tangier, Morocco, two weeks ago, whether he had fled after the collapse of the institution, which he is accused of having caused by wholesale theft, will arrive in port on the Hamburg-American liner Prinz Adelbert today.

His arrival will be the signal for a race to get possession of him. Stensland is in the custody of Assistant States Attorney Olsen, of Chicago, who was commissioned a United States agent to bring him here. Olsen and the state attorney's office of Chicago want to rush the president west before his son, Theodore Stensland, indicted for knowledge before the fact, and others interested can talk with the broken-spirited fugitive. Theodore Stensland arrived here last night to be ready to meet his father.

Detective Kinder, for the Chicago police, placed the necessary papers for extradition in the hands of Governor Higgins at Albany and Governor Stokes at Trenton, yesterday. He has permission to rush Stensland back to Chicago. It is said that Kinder has chartered C. K. G. Billings' yacht, one of the fastest in the harbor, to meet the Prinz Adelbert at quarantine.

The moment the yacht gets alongside the liner, it is the plan to put Stensland aboard of her, race to Jersey City and place him on a train for Chicago before his son can get to him. Before leaving Chicago young Stensland was quoted as having said this to say about the purposes of his trip. "If I have my way about it there will be a legal battle in New York and New Jersey to keep my father from coming to Illinois such as never before has been witnessed there. If father insists upon coming to Chicago he shall have his way. I believe the false accusations against him will make a fair and attainable trial in Cook County impossible."

CALLS TO BOTH WERE ACCEPTED

Rev. Norman Mackay Goes to Port Stanley, and Rev. Mr. Orr to Dorchester.

A special adjourned meeting of the Presbytery of London was held in First Church yesterday morning at 11 o'clock. Rev. W. H. Geddes, of Altona, presided, and among those present were Revs. A. Henderson, Hector Mackay, J. G. Stuart, London; Dr. Munro, Birr; Rev. R. W. Leitch, Delaware, and Dr. McCrae, Westminster.

It was announced that Rev. Norman Mackay, of Toronto, had accepted the call to Port Stanley, and that Rev. Mr. Orr had accepted the call from Dorchester and Crumlin. The induction at Dorchester will take place on Friday, the 5th of October, at 2 o'clock, and at Port Stanley on Thursday, 27th September, at 1 o'clock.

The resignation of Rev. A. W. Craw, M.A., Varnock, tendered at last meeting, was considered at length. From English Settlement there appeared Mr. Wm. Hedley, representing the session; Thomas B. Scott, the congregation; for Iderton, Mr. Wm. O. Telfer representing the session, and John R. Calvert representing the congregation.

All the representatives bore high testimony to the ability and zeal with which Mr. Craw had carried on his work for the past four years.

Mr. Craw, however, had insisted on his resignation being accepted and the congregation greatly regretted his removal.

Mr. Craw's resignation was accepted, to take effect after the end of the present month.

Revs. J. G. Stuart, A. Henderson, Dr. Munro and Dr. McCrae expressed the profound regret of the presbytery at Mr. Craw's leaving the bounds.

HELPING THE MONGOLIA.

Honolulu, Sept. 21.—The Japanese training ship Aneagawa is now anchored close to the steamer Mongolia, which is wrecked on a reef off Midway Island. Negotiations are now in progress between the officers of the steamship company and the Japanese Government to obtain the aid of the Aneagawa. In floating the Mongolia. The cable ship Restorer will leave here at once with supplies and wrecking apparatus for the relief of the Mongolia and passengers.
