QUERIES REGARDING MILITARY SERVICE Send In Your Problems and They Will Be Answered From Official Information by The Advertiser.

Question.—A man was discharged from a unit before it went overseas, and then again enlisted and after getting as far as England, was honorably discharged as permanently unfit. Can he be called up under the military service act?

Answer—He will be required to fill out an application for exemption, and produce his proof that he is medically unfit, as only those who have served in a theatra, of war (in this case, France), and been honorably discharged, are not included in the call to service.

Question—Is a young man, who will become twenty years of age this month liable to gervice under the present draft, when he attains that age? If not, is he liable to be called later?
