Ald. Chas. Moorhead Urges Use of Camps Only.

RUSH CONSTRUCTION WORK ON SUBWAY FOR FAIR GROUNDS

New Entrance Will Be Ready by July 1.

The large subway which is being constructed under the race track into the ring of the Western Fair grounds is being rapidly constructed. The excavation work is complete and a good start has been made on the concrete, the foundations of the side and centre pillars having already been poured.

The work is being carried on under the supervision of the city engineer and will give the residents of the vicinity a rather fine looking corner in place of the old eyecore in the shape of the stables, which have stood there for years.

The subway is to be a double one, providing an incoming and outgoing road. The grade under the track will be six per cent on the outside and eight per cent on the inside. It is expected that when the entrance is complete, the subway will be two gates. One on Egerton street for outgoing and one on Dundas street for incoming cars.

The engineer has promised the Great War Veterans' Association that he will have the track ready for use on July 1, and is rushing the work. The top of the subway will be of cement, with an earth covering. With no more rainy weather the track should be ready by that date.

The work of leveling up the grounds and fixing the fence will be done later. Contractors are also busy fixing up the women's building at the fair ground that was damaged by fire recently.

COLLECTORS' LICENSE REQUIRED FOR MEN PURCHASING EGGS

That Is If These Are Sold Within Ten Days.

James Gray, district representative of the Canada Food Board, has received word from Ottawa, stating that the law has been extended one month for all persons operating a public eating place to obtain a license.

Further orders, stating that on and after June 1st no person shall manufacture for sale in the Dominion of Canada food cream, candy, cake, confection, biscuits, pastry, confectionery, ice cream cones or chewing gum, without first having obtained from the Canada Food Board a license, to be called "Confectioner's License," have been issued to July 1st.

No person shall deal, wholesale, in meats, lard, cheese, oleomargarine, butter, eggs or poultry, without first having obtained a license known as "Produce Wholesaler's License," or "Produce Commission Merchant," or "Produce Brokers' License."

Any person engaged in such a business in more than one city or town or village shall obtain a license for each place. Any person engaged in the exclusive manufacture of meat products, lard, cheese butter or oleomargarine, is not required to obtain a license.

On and after June 1st any person collecting or purchasing eggs, or dairy butter from one farmer or another person who is actually a producer, and who sells such eggs or poultry within ten days of date of collection, or purchase, shall obtain a license known as "Produce Collector's License."
