WASHINGTON, July 14 .- The daylight saving plan, under which the clocks of the country are turned forward an hour in March and moved back in October, will be continued indefinitely.

This was assured today when, following President Wilson's veto of the \$33,000,000 agricultural appropriation bill, because of its rider repealing the daylight saving act, the House refused by a vote of 247 to 135

to pass the measure over the president's veto.

Hence advocates of the repeal said tonight, after the agricultural bill had been sent back to committee for elimination of the repeal provision, that no further effort would be made at this session, perhaps not in this Congress, which continues in existence until March, 1921, to wipe out the daylight saving act. There was no indication, they said, that they would be able to strengthen their forces.
