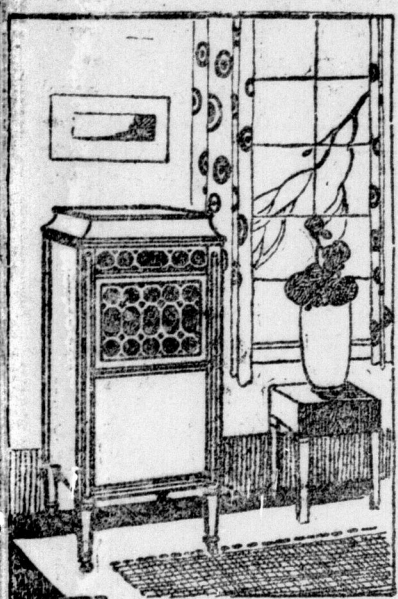




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## SHERATON

## SENSATIONAL CHINESE VAUDEVILLE ACT IS APPEARING AT GRAND

With Mary Pickford starring in the feature film, "The Hoodlum," all records for attendance at the Grand have been broken this week. This photoplay is worth the price of admission in itself. As Amy Burke, Miss Pickford depicts the part of a girl whose chief life prob-

lem is how to spend money. Amy's day begins with a lesson from a high-priced tutor who is averse to her vast wealth, and consequently quite indifferent as to her education. Her wealthy but unscrupulous grandfather has also employed a groom who accompanies her on all auto excursions and whose advice she does not heed.

All of this luxury suddenly fades away, showing Amy as a penniless girl whose real character is brought out when her devoted but poor father returns to town after a long absence. She prefers to live in a tenement with her father than to continue living at her grandfather's house without him. How a discovery made by Amy while living in the tenements aids her in restoring to respectability a man whom she loves and whom her grandfather had unjustly sent to the penitentiary makes a pleasing and interesting ending to this second of Miss Pickford's release under the banner of First National.

### REVUE COMING SOON

That the Canadian soldiers in France were royally entertained while billeted near the front lines, has been amply evidenced to the home folks since the arrival of the famous Dumbells, who are playing a home-coming tour of the larger Canadian cities. These soldier-actors will present their original overseas revue, "Bill, Bing, Bang," at the Grand Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday evenings at 8:15, and Wednesday matinee at 2:30.

The company gave over 500 performances in France, 40 in Brussels and 38 in London. The cast and chorus are made up entirely of soldier-actors, who have averaged six months each in the trenches before having been brought out of the line and given places in the entertainment company. Seats are now on sale for all performances.
