The deputation did not ask for the discontinuation of the board, so much as a change of method and personnel. The members contended that in its hunt for evidence the board frequently caused serious inconvenience to firms engaged in fair and legitimate business. They objected to the assumption that ability to make profits was reprehensible thing. The fact that one firm made higher profits than another of equal capitalization, they contended should not be construed as an evidence of improper practice or profiteering on the part of the first, but might very well mean than the first was conducted on greater lines of the efficiency than the latter, a condition which should be

on greater lines of the efficiency than the latter, a condition which should be encouraged rather than discouraged.

In Camera.


They contended that the public was getting the impression that any firm which made profits was bleeding the public. The delegation contended that preliminary investigations by the board at least should be conducted in camera, since they objected to publicity being given to the private affairs of concerns. If the preliminary hearing disclosed improper practices then thereafter there should be the fullest possible publicity. They warned the Government that increased production would be hampered by undue interference with business affairs. They further complained about the personnel of the board, declaring that two lawyers and a labor representative did not constitute a well balance tribunal. A businessman of outstanding ability should be added.

The farmers on the other hand contend that an agriculturist should be added. The Government, while promising consideration to the representations, declared that the creation of the board was in response to widespread public demand. The consumer must be given every consideration, more especially in view of the fact that the consumer was not organized to the same extent as either the manufacturer or the farmer.


