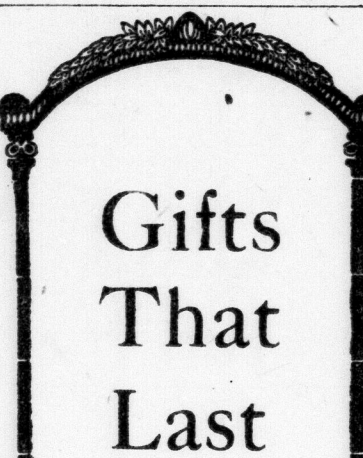

## LONDON METHODIST CONFERENCE OPENED IN THE CLASSIC CITY

Many Pastors Invited To Remain For A Fifth Year.

STRAITFORD, May 31.—This afternoon the probationers' record committee of the London Methodist Conference opened its sittings at Central Methodist Church, preparatory to the main sessions of the conference which open Thursday.

Tonight the stationing and statistical committees opened their sessions at Trinity and Central churches respectively. They will continue to meet on Tuesday. On Wednesday the ministerial sessions open, and on Thursday the main conference.

The fact that at least half a dozen ministers have been invited to remain at their present stations for a fifth year presents a new problem for the stationing committee which meets tomorrow. Hitherto the maximum term has been four years. Upwards of four hundred delegates are expected.
