DISEASE IN NOVA SCOTIA BIRCH

1. Has the serious situation respecting the disease prevalent in Nova Scotia birch come to the attention of the Department of Reconstruction and Supply?

2. Has the federal government been requested by the Nova Scotia government to relax export restrictions on Nova Scotia birch, and, if so, when will action be taken?

- 1. Yes.
- 2. Yes. The dominion government was requested to relax the export controls on infested birch. This was refused because of the difficulty of differentiating between lumber cut from infested trees and lumber cut from healthy ones and, also, the need of protecting Canadian consumers. Instead, a proposal was made to the government of Nova Scotia that if the cut of birch this year exceeded that of last year, 75 per cent of this excess could be exported.
