The Latter May Have to Operate the Line--A Large Amount of Business Transacted in the Legislature Yesterday.

Fredericton, N. B., April 10--The House met at 8 o'clock. Mr. Osmen gave notice of motion that government house should be re-established as an official residence. Mr. King, from the committee on corporations, reported recommending a royal commission issue to the evidence with reference to the operations of the Restigouche Boom Company.
