PUMPED HIS BLOOD INTO WIFE'S VEINS

Mrs. Anderson of Philadelphia, Dying from Anemia, May Now Live as the Result of a Transfusion of Blood from Her Husband's Veins to Her's.

NEW YORK, March 30.—For the first time in this city, transfusion of blood was resorted to yesterday to save the life of a patient, says a despatch from Philadelphia.

Anderson was anaesthetized and the pulse artery in his left arm was severed, and the ordeal of the operation, soon rallied, and bids fair to be himself again in a few days.

At 11:45 they went over to the west side and lunched at 1 o'clock on the Empress of Britain, and at 5 o'clock this afternoon they will be given a clambake by John Long, warden of the municipality, at the breakwater.

Senator Young and J. E. Cyr said that the more they saw of St. John the more they were convinced that it was one of the finest ports in Canada. Both gentlemen said that it required many improvements, which should be made immediately.

The members enjoyed the trip very much about the I. C. R. terminals. They were first taken out to the new island yard, and also inspected the workings of the new round house. They then returned to the depot and were taken down to the Ballast wharf and up around the branch, visiting the I. C. R. piers at Long wharf.

CHARGES OF GRAPE SCATTER PEASANTS
