Rio Janeiro, Oct. 26.—The president
of the republic, Dr. Braz, has sent a
message to congress declaring that it is
impossible to avoid the state of war which
Germany has imposed on Brazil. He pro-
poses the seizure of a German warship now
in the port of Bahia.

The majority leader of the chamber
discussed the relations between Brazil
and Germany and counselled the cham-
ber to approve the presidential mes-
sage.

BIG EXPLOSION AT VAUDREUIL

Part of Plant of Canada Explosives Company Blown Up This Morning

Montreal, Oct. 26.—A part of the plant of the Canada Explosives Company at Vaudreuil was destroyed by fire this morning and the 1,500 hands employed had to beat a hasty retreat. Reports from Vaudreuil indicate that there has been no loss of life.

The neighborhood was rocked at intervals for nearly an hour by tremendous explosions, while the sky was lit up by the flames of burning acids.

Montreal, Oct. 26.—The monetary loss from the fire at Vaudreuil will be about \$1,600,000.

The fire was started by a spark from an electric motor in the shell loading part of the plant. E. M. Montpetit and P. Lavasseur were slightly injured.

BRITAIN WILL STAND BY RUSSIA AND ROUMANIA

Lord Robert Cecil Specifically Denies German Rumors of Separate Peace Move

London, Oct. 25.—In the House of Commons yesterday Lord Robert Cecil, minister of blockade, gave a categorical denial to rumors circulated by Germany that the western powers were contemplating a separate peace at the expense of Russia and Roumania.

"The government," he said, "is determined to abide by our treaty with Russia and Roumania, and will stand by them in the present crisis."

R. Tasker Steele.
Hamilton, Ont., Oct. 25.—R. Tasker Steele, one of Hamilton's most prominent citizens, died at his home early this morning, aged 63 years. Mr. Steele was a member of the Hamilton Rowing Club and was a great supporter of the Tigers Football Club and a familiar figure among all their trips.

Toronto, Oct. 25.—Rev. Dr. B. D. Thomas, perhaps the best loved man in the Baptist convention of Ontario and Quebec, died this morning, aged about 75, at his residence in Grimsby, where he had lived retired for some years.

Miss Etta Mutch.
Newcastle, N. B., Oct. 25.—The death occurred at her home in Littleton early this morning of Miss Etta J. Mutch, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Samuel Mutch, after a short illness, aged twenty years. Deceased is survived by three brothers—Norris, James and Edison, all of Littleton; also five sisters—Misses Laura, Eliza, Beatrice and Martha Mutch, all at home.

The funeral will take place at 2 o'clock tomorrow afternoon at the Baptist cemetery, Littleton.

The Late Captain Estabrooks.
Captain Leander Estabrooks, whose death was announced in yesterday's paper, previous to his service on the ferry was connected with steamboating on the river for many years.

In the early season of 1887 he was with the late Captain John McMillin on the May Queen, running to Fredericton, and later acted as mate and purser with his brother, Captain L. Estabrooks on the steamer Star. On the retirement of the late Captain David Weston from command of the David Weston he became master of the Star, his brother having been transferred to the David Weston. In 1886 he had charge of the Weston and in 1887 commanded the Soudan which ran to Fredericton. Later on he acted as agent for the Union Line until the fall of 1890 when he became a part owner in the steamer, which at this date had been transferred back to the Washademoak Lake. After his retirement from the Star he took charge of the Springfield on the Bellefleur for a few years.

His passing away is much regretted not only by a large circle of city friends, but also by those of people along the river and tributaries and the traveling public feel that they have lost a valued and highly esteemed steamboat captain.
