GO ON STAGE WITH

New York, Dec. 26.—It is understood the owners of the Yankees are in a fairly receptive mood as regards the acquisition of Eddie Plank, a veteran southpaw, though they positively decline to give up any young and promising material for the old port sider. Plank has served notice on Fielder Jones that he will retire from baseball unless sold or traded to some eastern club, and gives a very valid reason for his decision. He has spent two seasons in torrid St. Louis and does not want any more baseball under the conditions prevailing there. As he is well fixed financially, and is not sacrificing his career, as would a younger player in retiring, the officials of the Browns are not inclined to the belief that he is bluffing. Jones is trying to put through a deal which will bring the Browns some playing material in return, but is handicapped because no club will give up ayoung star for a player who may have no more than another season or two of major league baseball in him. Plank's work last season did not indicate that he is so near the passing stage, but has passed his fortieth birthday, so his days in the majors are limited. As Connie Mack has no desire of getting Plank back on the club, with which he gained his greatest fame, only the Yankees, Red Sox and Senators are left to bid for him. He would fit in well with any of the three, and would give the Yankees three good southpaws in Plank, Cullop

"Heedless of human suffering, in which their own countrymen are participating as much as any, they pursue their selfish lives of greed and licentiousness and infamy. Berlin night life, always a scandal and a blot on Germany's honon, vis a crying shame in war time."
