

## LARGER VESSEL SECURED FOR SERVICE HERE

Company Gets Magnified For  
Business With New-  
foundland

### NEW WEST INDIES PLAN IS WORKING

### Homestead Here This Month —To Take Cargo South

An improved steamship service between this port and St. John's, Nfld., and the possibility of a new service to the West Indies from St. John's, which will include both Halifax and Saint John as ports of call, were announced this morning at the office of Furness Withy & Co., Ltd., local agents for the Newfoundland Canada Traders, Ltd., the line putting on these two services.

The service between this port and St. John's will be carried on by the steamer "Magnified." This vessel is much larger than the Newton Bay, which ran on this route for a time earlier in the season. Since she was sold by the company the service has been discontinued. It is planned to have a sailing every 10 days, and the vessel will call at Halifax and St. Pierre en route. The first sailing will be from this port some time next week.

The steamer Homestead will arrive here on April 21 to load for San Diego, Kingston, Jamaica, San Domingo, San Juan and Ponce. This vessel is operated by the same company, and she will run between St. John's and the West Indies. It is hoped to work up enough business so that Halifax and Saint John can be made regular ports of call. It was said both of these services will be operated all the year around.

The Norwegian steamer Facto, Captain Eliesen, came off the Maine Slip in Halifax Sunday and docked at Dartmouth Pier, to load lumber for an American port.

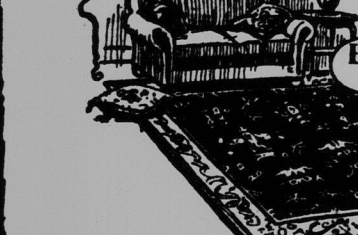
### SCHOONER TOWED HERE

having goods ordered to Alberta territory, then the consignee would divert the car to Vancouver and get the benefit of the lower freight rate. This reminds one of "bootlegging" even in freight rates.

### ASKS ABOUT STEAMER

Dr. S. J. McLean asked if a direct steamer service from Saint John to Vancouver would not solve the problem of the company and Mr. McLean said it would help but there was no such service. There was a service from Montreal and Halifax but when the local freight rate was added there was no saving over the direct haul by rail.

### STATES FREIGHT RATES

Hon. Frank Oliver asked what the rate to Vancouver was and Mr. McLean said it was \$1.41 per 100 pounds. Mr. Oliver said that the rate to Vancouver was \$2.19 per 100 pounds. He was able to lay down their goods in Calgary for \$1.28 per 100 pounds or an advantage of 84 cents per 100 pounds. Commissioner Oliver asked if the application of the Vancouver rate to Calgary shipments would meet the situation and Mr. McLean said it would and they would be able to compete with the foreign packers.

### COMMISSIONER COMMENTS

Commissioner Oliver remarked that it looked to him as if it was a case of the railway reducing the rate by 71 cents or losing the business altogether.

Mr. Flinford said the railway would be better off without the business than carrying it at a loss.

Commissioner Oliver said it seemed to him that in this case a Canadian industry was being injured and a large one benefited by the rate and some remedy should be arrived at.

### HEATER CAR SERVICE

The application of J. A. Kelly to have the minimum load of the heater car reduced to 10,000 pounds was then taken up. Mr. Kelly said that at times it was hard to get the 15,000 pounds now required.

Mr. Flinford said this matter had been discussed before, and the railway felt they were doing all possible to serve the shippers. He read a table showing that of 43 cars shipped this last winter only four had been below the 15,000 pounds.

### ASSOCIATION REQUESTS

The association asked that they either be given a proper self heating car, especially designed for the trade, or that alterations along the lines suggested be made in the refrigerator cars.

The submission of Mr. Hagerman was endorsed by Guy P. Porter. Commissioner McLean suggested that the association take the suggested improvements up with the railway authorities.

Mr. Flinford said the board had no jurisdiction to order a heating service for the United States, but they had jurisdiction in Canada. He said the railway had gone to a great deal of trouble to provide a suitable carrier for potatoes and were willing to meet the wishes of the potato shippers when they had made up their minds just what kind of car they wanted.

He was informed, he said, that it was not feasible to build permanent racks and bulkheads in these refrigerator cars.

Adjournment was made at this point.

Hon. H. A. McKinnon, chief commissioner, and Dr. S. J. McLean and Hon. Frank Oliver are the members of the commission sitting at this hearing.

If these arrangements could not be made, he said, the inquiry would be held when the Lingan arrives here with coal about April 24. The Lingan is at present at Halifax undergoing repairs.

## Trinity College Prevost Predicts Fifty Millions For Canada By 20th Century End

TORONTO, Ont., April 13—A population of 50,000,000 people for Canada before the end of the 20th century was predicted by Provost O. A. Seagraves, of Trinity College, last night, when he spoke to members of Young People's groups of several parish churches of North Toronto.

"I am not talking like a real estate agent," he said, "but from a firm conviction that Canada has not yet awakened to a full consciousness of nationhood and that she is destined to expand extensively in size and internally in national consciousness and power. It is worth the devotion of the lifetime of a man or woman to serve this country of ours."

No country within the next century would so profoundly influence the course of the world's history as Canada, the speaker said, with the possible exception of India, China and Japan.
