Act Permits Levy on Non-Residents Working in **Moncton City**

DORCHESTER, July 27—At the opening session of the semi-annual meeting of the Westmorland Municipal Council, this afternoon, the warden of the county was empowered to employ counsel to test the collection of the income tax imposed by the city of Moncton on persons working in the city and residing outside. The tax complained of by those assessed is authorized by an Act of Legislature passed in 1921, and this year was the first time it was imposed.

The matter was brought before the Council by Councillor, LeBlanc, of Shediac and the main argument against such a tax was made by E. R. McDonald, Mayor of Shediac. He contended that it was unjust and unfair and a breach of faith on the part of Moncton as he contended it was understood employees of the C. N.
