CALGARY, Oct. 10.—Addressing a large meeting here last night, Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen, leader of the Opposition, laid down his policies particularly urging that the equalization of freight rates must be effected by the Board of Railway Commissioners; also that the problem must be treated as a national one. No reduction should be made for one part of the country which had been already refused to another.

The Petersen ship subsidy contract came into Mr. Meighen's speech for the first time this week. "It was a grotesque farce," and had been "laughed out of parliament." But it was the only panacea that the government had been able to offer for Canada's transportation burden. The western extremity of Canada was in the same position as the extreme east. Both carried an undue share of the transportation burden and were entitled to assistance from the whole Dominion.

TRANSPORTATION  
The Conservative party, he said, recognized that the west and extreme east bore undue shares of the burden of transportation cost. When the basis of rates were fixed by the proper tribunal, the requirement of equalization might necessitate contributions by the whole Dominion to the reduction of the unfair burdens borne by the west and the Maritimes.

But Canada would never be in a position to solve her railway problem unless industry was stimulated and railway traffic increased. Tariff reform, he said, was the only way to solve the problem.

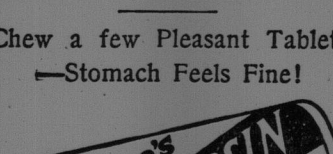

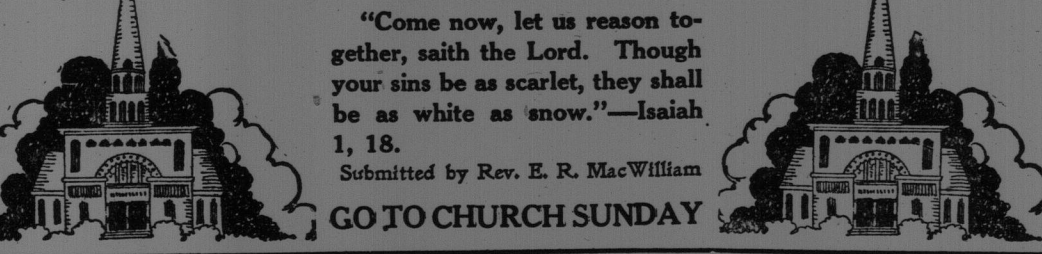
