Friends in Saint John have received word of the marriage of Rev. L. B. Grey, former pastor of the Waterloo Street Baptist church, which took place in Milton, Mass., on November 11. The bride was Miss Alma G. Jardine. The Quincy Patriot has the following account of the wedding:

"A wedding of unusual interest to Milton and Quincy residents took place Wednesday evening, Nov. 11, at the First Baptist church, Milton, when the pastor, Rev. Leonard Benjamin Grey, took as his bride Miss Alma Jardine of Goddard street, South Quincy, formerly of East Milton. The entire congregation was invited, and with other invited guests, the church was crowded to its fullest capacity. The ceremony was performed at 8 o'clock by Rev. Frederick B. Greely of Somerville. Miss Jardine was given in marriage by her father, Mr. G. W. Jardine. The veil of tulle, and the headpiece of rare old lace, were crowned with



orange blossoms, and she carried a bouquet of lilies of the valley and bride roses.

Miss Euphemia Regine of Quincy, the bridesmaid, was dressed in pale pink georgette trimmed with bands of cut velvet. She carried a bouquet of tea roses. The best man was Warren Geddes of East Milton, and the ushers were Kenneth Johnson, Malcolm Howe and Charles Lewis of East Milton, and Paul Killen of Nantucket, a nephew of the bride.

"The church was profusely decorated with ferns, palms and white chrysanthemums. Miss Mabelle E. Smith of Quincy, the church organist, played the wedding march and gave an organ recital before the ceremony, and Eugene Levy, a student at the Newton Theological Seminary, sang 'O Promise Me'.

"The bride presented to her bridesmaid a silver link bracelet set with amethysts, and the bridegroom gave the best man and ushers silver monogrammed tie clasps.

"The couple departed midst a shower of confetti and good wishes on their honeymoon. On their return they will reside at 38 Bryant avenue, East Milton. Rev. Mr. Grey is a graduate of Acadia College, Nova Scotia, and Newton Theological Seminary. He took up his pastorate in Milton a year ago."

The native then rose, suffering from nothing worse than fright.

WOMAN'S QUICK WIT ROUTS FIVE THIEVES
MEXICO CITY, Nov. 25.—Five thieves were routed by Mrs. R. B. Wilson, wife of an American contractor here, through the ingenious use of a phonograph. Mrs. Wilson, who lives in an isolated section of the city, was alone late at night when to her alarm she heard footsteps outside. Peering from the window she discerned five men leap the wall enclosing the grounds and secret themselves in the shrubbery. A moment later a strident male voice sounded through the house. The thieves took flight immediately.

FLORIDA'S SUICIDE RATE ON INCREASE
Proportions Jump 28 Per Cent. Since Recent Prosperity Boom Started

NEW YORK, Nov. 25.—Florida's suicide rate since the recent prosperity boom started has increased 28 per cent over that existing 8 years ago while at the same time the general death rate showed a 25 per cent. improvement during the same period.

These facts were brought out in a comparative study of the effect of the Florida boom on the Florida death rate made by the Metropolitan Insurance Company. While suicides increased and the general death rate decreased, the number of deaths in 1924 were only 22 per hundred thousand compared to 10.4 in 1916.

Artist Colony Votes For Postal Delivery
CARMEL, Cal., Nov. 25.—This seaside village, last refuge of art in California, soon is to have numbered streets, so that its painters and writers may be awakened from their dreams by the shrill sound of the postman's whistle.

In recent elections and referendums the artistic element defeated propositions for a city manager form of government, to straighten out and pave the streets and to install electric street lights.

The petition for street numbers in order to get free delivery of mail, however, had only 64 names of persons opposing it, with 334 seeking the move. But true artists mourn what they fear is the opening wedge of "babbling."

Precious Minerals Located In Brazil

RIO DE JANEIRO, Nov. 25.—Rich deposits of Samarskite, Columbite and Monazite, all precious minerals, have been discovered near the town of Ubu, State of Minas Geraes, Brazil.

Analysis made by Dr. Djalma Gullmaras, geologist of the Brazilian Ministry of Agriculture, revealed that the samarskite is rich in uranium and radium, and that the monazite is rich in thorium. Monazite was found in enormous crystals.
