WOOL MARKETS.

Ottawa, June 22.—(Canadian Press)—The Dominion wool market report for the week ended June 24 states that no change in prices has been noted during the last week in Canada, but that trading has been of small extent that quotations are only nominal. Small lots of eastern domestic wool sold from 18 cents for coarse and 25 cents for medium. The United States reports indicate a more cheerful tone to the market with slight advance in prices. The English market is reported much stronger.
