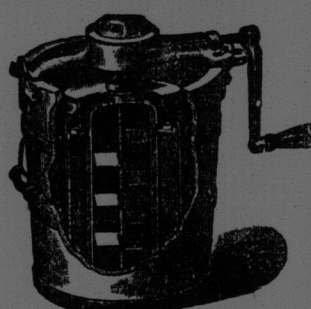

### ANOTHER POLICE PROBE ORDERED

This One Aimed at Commissioner; He Replies

#### PAVING POLICIES

Cannot Discard Local Improvements Act—Co-operation For Permanent Sidewalks—To Purchase Motor Ambulance

Another police investigation will be one of the results of the meeting of the common council yesterday afternoon.

This time, however, it is the commissioner who is the head of the department and not the members of the force, at whom the investigation is aimed.

Still another investigation was asked for but was not ordered as no second could be found.

The investigation was proposed by Com. Potts as a result of Com. McLellan's request that he be allowed two special policemen to work under his orders.

Com. Potts said this might be a method of finding a job for Policeman O'Leary, who had been dismissed, and asked for an investigation. There was no second. Com. McLellan explained the circumstances and his recommendation was adopted.

An investigation into police pay rolls has already been ordered and Com. McLellan promised to submit the papers requested to the mayor.

Com. Potts then asked for an investigation of a charge that Com. McLellan had attempted to dissuade Policeman Briggs from attending to his duty when the latter was watching a place suspected of selling liquor illegally.

Com. McLellan explained the circumstances from which the charge arose, and was not disposed to take the matter seriously. He welcomed an investigation and was ordered by the council.

Com. McLellan hinted at counter-investigations.

Matters relating to the streets and the city's paving policy took up most of the time of the common council yesterday afternoon not devoted to police matters.

Com. Potts was given authority to lay a tar macadam pavement on Canterbury street and money was provided for this out of next year's estimates and also for similar pavements on Church and Princess streets, to the extent of \$10,000.

His recommendation to pave Market square and lay a permanent sidewalk on the north side of King square, at the city's expense, was defeated by Mr. McLellan's opposition to the principle involved of establishing a precedent for shodding the local improvements act.

Tenders for supplies for the water and sewerage department were opened and the contracts will be awarded at a adjourned meeting at noon today, when other unfinished business will be dealt with.

The commissioner of public safety asked authority to purchase boilers for steam fire engines, and the council paid \$50 by bond issue; estimated cost, \$1,500. His recommendation was adopted.

The commissioner of harbors, ferries and public lands recommended that renewal leases issue to W. E. Scully of lot 324, 325, and 326, Brooks ward, for seven years, at \$8 per lot per annum, in advance of twenty per cent on the present rentals; that renewal lease issue to Nicholas Ryan, administrator of the estate of James Ryan, of lot in block 1, Lancaster, for seven years, at \$11 per annum rental, being an increase of ten per cent on the original rental of \$10 per annum; that renewal lease issue to Mrs. Isabel Kee of lot No. 192, Guys ward, for seven years from May 1, 1915, at \$21 per annum, that he be authorized to purchase eight long and six short joints of cotton hose for the Sand Point warehouses, to replace the said number of joints which have been condemned; that renewal lease issue to Mrs. Mary C. Melvin of one-quarter of lot No. 228, Guys ward, for seven years from May 1, 1915, at \$25 per annum, being an advance of twenty per cent on the present rental.

The recommendations were approved and adopted.

Adam Shand's application for permission to erect an electric sign over his premises, 33 Germain street, was referred to the city engineer.

An application of the St. John Railway Company for permission to erect poles in Meadow and Adelaide streets was referred to the road engineer for location.

Com. Potts then moved that the city pay half the cost of an asphalt sidewalk with concrete base in Queen street between Wentworth and Pitt streets at a cost of \$2,770 to be met by a by-law, sue, provided that all the property owners agreed to pave the other half.

The motion carried.

Com. Potts moved that a permanent sidewalk be laid on the north side of King square, at the city's expense, and that the city engineer be authorized to lay a permanent sidewalk on the north side of King square, at the city's expense.

Com. Potts drew attention to the need of repairing Rutheys avenue and the fact that there was no funds. The matter was laid over until further information regarding expenditures last year on this section could be secured.

A communication from the King Square Realty Company asking the city to enforce the by-law prohibiting teamsters to stand on the north side of King square was allowed to lie on the table until the next session.

At the meeting of the common council yesterday, Com. McLellan recommended the purchase of a motor ambulance at a cost not to exceed \$4,000, price and description to be laid before the council before the purchase is made; to be paid for by bond issue.

The motion was adopted.

Commissioner Potts moved that the water and sewerage department, before digging any street should notify the department of public works, only excepting in case of emergency; also that the street department should repair water streets to the satisfaction of the road engineer charging the cost thereof to the water and sewerage department. The motion was carried.

It was moved by Commissioner Potts that \$1,000 be placed to the credit of the street department to care for the burning of waste paper. The motion was adopted.
