THE FARMERS

A Statement Having Bearing on Stuation in This and Other

Once a man has been arrested and handed over to the military authorities he passes from the jurisdiction of the he passes from the jurisdiction of the Military Service Council, and any steps for his release from military duty are to be taken through the leave of absence boards, which have been specially formed for dealing with such matters. As regards so-called farmers, however, it is not sufficient for a man to say that he is not sufficient for a man to say that he is a farmer and expect to be released on his own statement; full proof must be fur-nished that he is a bona fide farmer, that he has been in actual work on a farm for a considerable period of time, and that his services on his own or his em ployer's farm cannot be dispensed with.
