SOME FEAR NOW THAT RUSSIA AND CHINA MAY GET INTO FIGHT

Shanghai, Nov. 18.—War between China and Russia is considered a serious possibility here. President Yuan Shi Kai opposes it, but messages from Wu Chang and that Vice-President Li Yuan Hung who is so strong and influential as Yuan, was insisting on it.

Li in his demand for the provincial governors almost to a man, the army, the cabinet, the national assembly, formed to understand the situation. It is thought extremely likely his government will fall.

The Russo-Chinese dispute is over outer Mongolia, a territory nearly one-third the size of Europe. Certain Mongolian princes recently declared their independence. Russia recognized it. The Chinese asserted that but a few men were behind the declaration and that Russia hired them to issue it, meaning really to grab the entire territory. At all events, it is not denied that Russian troops have been occupying strategic points ever since.

Higher Interest Charges.

Montreal, Nov. 18.—The Gazette says:—Notices were sent out by a number of brokerage offices towards the end of last week notifying clients of an increase in their interest charges from 12 to 17 p. c. In September, it will be recalled, the stock exchanges raised the minimum interest rate to be charged by members from 10 to 15 p. c. The bank rate was then 12 p. c. Within a week of the exchange action, the bank rate had been advanced to 6 p. c.

Later, with the money as tight as it has been through the month, there has been talk of raising the exchange rate to 7 p. c., but again the opposition has been very strong, and the committee has taken no action as to an increase. However, some of the brokers of their own initiative notified clients in the closing days of last week that their rate would be 7 p. c.

Some of the activity in Quebec Railway with the advance in price to 15 on Saturday is ascribed to rumors that the dominion government will come to the assistance of the Saguenay enterprise, the assistance to the building was comparatively small, but the net loss will be heavy.

CITY WANTS TO APPOINT THE CHIEF

Mr. McLellan's Report on St. John Police to go to Government—The Market—Today's Council

The common council met this afternoon and the following reports were taken up: The commissioner of harbors, ferries and public lands recommended sale of Corporation Lot No. 223, fronting on the north side of Duke street, at auction on November 22, and that the Norton Grifflin Dredging Company, Limited, and the Beaver Dredging Company be each allowed to occupy a space of 100 feet on the top of the North Rodney wharf, at an annual rental of \$250.

The commissioner of public safety recommended that a memorial be forwarded to the lieutenant governor in council, asking that the appointment of the chief of police be vested in the common council, and a copy of the report of the commissioner be forwarded with memorial; that the vacancies on the police force be now filled upon condition that the appointees are recommended by the commissioner.

The commissioner reports that he has appointed David W. Belyea deputy clerk of the market and that he has temporarily appointed William J. Daves an assistant and he recommends that he receive such remuneration as the commissioner may think proper.

The commissioner of water and sewerage recommended excavating a trench, etc. for water extension in DeLoists street, the tender of Moses & Steeves at \$325 a lineal foot for rock and 69 cents for earth.

The commissioner of public works recommended that George Robinson be permitted to place an electric flash light globe under the sidewalk in front of his premises 221 Union street, (West).

STARVE WITH FEED ALL AROUND

London, Nov. 18.—A correspondent of the Daily Telegraph, at the Turkish headquarters at Halimkendi and the following dated Friday: "The Turkish soldiers are starving. They are suffering from the effects of the terrible Luleburgaz battle and are falling easy victims to the cholera and dysentery. Even close as the army is in Constantinople, the men are receiving only a bare ration of bread with rice occasionally."

"At Luleburgaz enormous herds of sheep grazed under the fire of the enemy and were driven off with the routed army. Yet hundreds of men died of starvation in eight days. Any other army would have considered it Godsent. The Turk is not a meat eater and seems to be unable to change the habits of his life in time even to meet the exigencies of actual starvation."

"The men openly declare that they don't want to fight. It is impossible to arouse in the Asiatic Turkish soldiers any enthusiasm over a war in European Turkey."
