NEW BRUNSWICK MAN AMONG THE EIGHT KILLED

Only One Hand and Torn Clothing of Prescott Northrup Recovered

Kingston, Ont., June 2—Eight men killed, and six men are in the general hospital seriously injured as the result of an accident in a construction camp of the Canadian Northern Railway six miles east of Stone's Corner, Perth road.

MAGISTRATE DANIEL JORDAN IS DEAD

Sackville, N. B., June 3—(Special)—The death of Daniel Jordan, K. C., police magistrate for Sackville, took place this morning at eight o'clock. He was struck with paralysis on Friday and never regained consciousness. He was sixty-seven years old, and a native of St. John.

FRENCH TROOPS WIN VICTORY OVER THE MOROCCO TRIBESMEN

Fes, Morocco, June 3—A strong column sent out by General Lyautay, the French commander, dispersed the tribesmen six miles outside of Fes. The French artillery shelled the camp, inflicting heavy loss on the tribesmen, who have been making continuous attacks against the city.

MOTOR CAR FACTORY IS DESTROYED AND A FIREMAN KILLED

Adrian, Mich., June 3—Fire destroyed the factory of the Lion Motor Car Company with all its contents, and resulted in the death of Fireman Christian Schoon, who was struck by falling walls. The property damage is estimated at \$350,000, with insurance amounting to \$180,000.

Liverpool, June 2—A serious fire broke out in the Cunard steamer Curamba, lying at her dock this afternoon. The fire, which was extinguished this evening, was confined to the saloon quarters which were practically destroyed. The damage is estimated at many thousands of dollars.

WAS NOT A GENERAL HOLIDAY IN MONTREAL

Montreal, June 3—King George's forty-seventh birthday was not observed as a general holiday in Montreal. The banks and other similar institutions were closed, while the post office, government offices, courts, and other official institutions also observed the day.

BYRAN'S Campaign Man Dead

Colorado Springs, Colo., June 3—Oliver C. Davis, of counsel for the International Harvester Company and former campaign manager for W. J. Bryan, is dead at his home "Pilot Knob." He was sixty-two years old.

MORE IDLE AND MORE ARE AT WORK

Union Men Join London Strikers; Non-Unionists Take Jobs

DOCKERS FACE STARVATION They Are Getting no Strike Pay and the Pawn Brokers Are Refusing Any More Loans—Some Rough Handling by Strikers' Pickets

MAY WAS ALMOST A RECORD RAIN MONTH

TRIED TO BRIBE DETECTIVE

Chicago, June 3—Five Chinese, all men, who are believed to have been smuggled into the United States from Canada and all of whom were well supplied with money, were arrested last night in South Chicago. Two detectives who made the arrest were offered \$500 by one of the Chinese, apparently the leader, not to arrest them.

BRITISH GOLF CHAMPIONSHIPS

London, June 3—Play started today in the British amateur golf championship at Westward Ho, with 155 entries, the lowest number since 1904. H. P. Hilton is defending his title of British amateur champion and is installed the favorite.
