MADE NEXT WEEK**

Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux Will Take Place of Hon. L. P. Brodeur, While Dr. Bland is New Postmaster General—Financial Statement

Ottawa, Aug. 4.—The cabinet change foreshadowed some time ago in connection with the retirement of Hon. L. P. Brodeur, minister of marine and fisheries and of naval affairs, to take the position in the supreme court bench rendered vacant by the death of Justice Girouard, will take place next week.

Hon. Mr. Brodeur is now winding up pending matters of departmental administration in connection with his portfolio, so as to have things in good shape for his successor, Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux, the present postmaster-general.
Dr. Bland, the young, able and popular member for Beauce, will enter the cabinet as postmaster-general and will be sworn in within a few days at Murray Bay (Que.), where Earl Grey now is.The new minister will address meetings both in Ontario and Quebec during the campaign.
Hon. Mr. Lemieux will go to Simcoe with Sir Wilfrid for the premier's opening meeting of the campaign on August 15. The other ministers to accompany Sir Wilfrid to Simcoe will be Hon. Geo. P. Graham and Hon. W. L. MacKenzie King.

The cabinet council today succeeded in clearing up most of the arrears of departmental business and until after the elections it is not likely there will be any more full meetings of the cabinet. Most of the ministers are leaving either this week or next for their respective districts to plunge at once into active organizing and campaign work.

Hon. Mr. King left for Berlin tonight, and Hon. Mr. Templeman for Victoria.

Hon. Dr. Pugsley goes to St. John tomorrow and Hon. Frank Oliver will leave for the west on Sunday night.

Sir Frederick Borden, who will again contest Kings county, Nova Scotia, goes to Quebec tomorrow to meet Lady Borden, who is returning from England in company with her son-in-law, Col. Leslie McCoun. The latter is convalescent from the serious injuries sustained through being thrown from his horse in London during the coronation ceremonies.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier will spend tomorrow in Montreal in consultation with the party leaders in Quebec relative to organization work, the selection of candidates and plans of campaign. He will return to the capital at night and spend next week here.

Ottawa, Aug. 4.—The financial statement of the dominion for the first four months of the fiscal year shows a steadily growing revenue with expenditures remaining practically stationary.

The income for the four months was \$40,290,771, an increase of \$4,783,732, as compared with last year. For July the increase was \$1,745,839.

The expenditure on consolidated fund account for the four months was \$23,002,688, an increase of \$903,639 compared with last year. The expenditure on capital account was \$4,644,799, a decrease of \$1,122,338.

With over \$30,000,000 of supply voted by parliament before dissolution and an expenditure so far of about \$28,000,000 the government will have about \$2,000,000 available to carry on the administration until the new parliament meets in October.

The public debt on July 31 was \$327,181,427, a decrease of \$1,500,000, as compared with the same date last year.

With the revenues increasing at the rate of over \$1,000,000 a month and with the public debt showing a decrease, it is safe to say the opposition will not make the government's financial administration an issue in this campaign.

**HOW TO SECURE BEAUTY
PLAYGROUNDS AT PORTSMOUTH,
N. H., AT SMALL COST**

In addition to what the Sunset League is doing, a Citizens' Committee has been formed to help along the playgrounds. They are now building and have almost completed a very handsome pavilion. It has wide verandas on three sides, and in the interior a large room with hardwood floors which will be used when the weather is disagreeable for kindergarten work, teaching folk dances, and other indoor entertainments for the children. This pavilion will cost about fifteen hundred dollars, of which the town gave five hundred dollars. The principal teacher in the playgrounds this year is Miss Cloud of Lexington, Ky. (a playground expert). The supervisor is (C. D. Howard, physical director of the Y. M. C. A.).

It will be interesting to note the names of the teams in the Sunset League of baseball players. They are as follows—Portsmouth Athletic Club, Knights of Columbus, Y. M. C. A., the Elks, The Morley Button Makers, The Consolidated Coal Co., The Elery Twist Drill Co., The Steam Engineers, (from the navy yard). These teams play remarkably fast ball, sometimes going five innings without a score, or with a very small one.

City Engineer Parker was asked if the whole ground as it stands today represented a cost of five thousand dollars. He replied that it did not represent anything like that figure. Children are upon the grounds all day, and until dark in the evening.

Right in the area forming the playground there is a large pond, into which
