JESS WILLARD IN RING TONIGHT

Six Two Minute Rounds in Portland, Oregon.

Offer of \$850,000 for Ten Rounds With Dempsey—What the Movies Show in Siki-Carpenter Bout—Big Baseball Deal Declared Still On.

(Canadian Press) Portland, Oreg., Dec. 19.—Jess Willard, former heavyweight champion of the world, will box six two minute rounds here tonight in an exhibition under the auspices of the Milwaukee Boxing Commission.

Gloucester, N. S., Dec. 19.—Johnny Gillis of Gloucester Bay and Bud Smith of Sydney Mines fought a ten-round draw at Gloucester last night.

Portland, Oreg., Dec. 19.—W. J. Keper, principal owner of the Portland Pacific Coast League baseball club, last night telegraphed Jack Kearns, manager for Jack Dempsey, an offer of \$850,000 for a ten round boxing match for the heavyweight championship of the world, between Dempsey and Jess Willard here July 4, next.

Paris, Dec. 19.—A close study of the film of the Carpenter-Siki fight shows that Francois Descombes, manager of the French boxer, went to Siki's corner in the fourth round and said something to Hellers, the Senegalese manager, according to an article printed by L'Auto today.

The newspaper recalls that, according to Siki's allegations, it was in the fourth round that the negro had arranged to allow himself to be beaten.

Present Lausanne Peace Treaty Draft To Turks on Saturday
