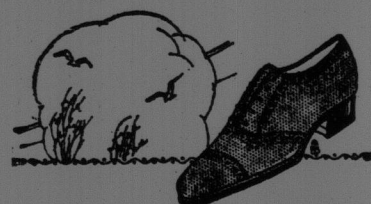

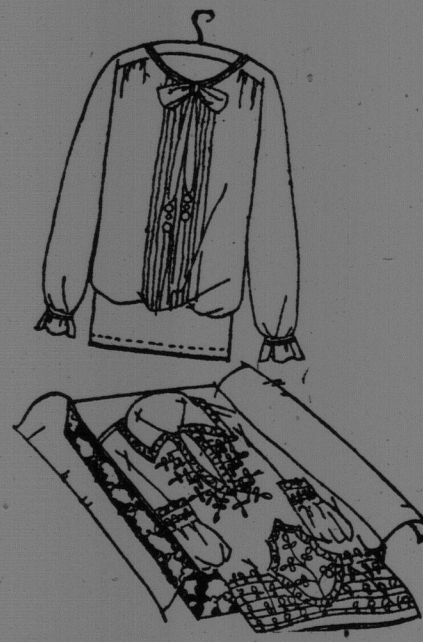

### SAYS POLICY IS TO USE CANADA PORTS

Routing of export traffic via Canadian ports wherever possible is the policy of the Canadian National Railways, the Minister of Railways stated in the House of Commons yesterday in answer to a question.

An agreement between the old Canadian Northern and the Government was cited by Hance Logan, Liberal member for Cumberland, who asked if the Government was carrying out the provision for consistent routing of traffic via Canadian ports over Canadian railways. The answer was that the principle involved in that agreement had been adopted as the policy of the Canadian National Railways.

### UNION SERVICES IN GRAND BAY AREA

An informal union of various denominations has existed for some time in Grand Bay and South Bay, the clergymen going out from Fairville from the Presbyterian, Methodist, Baptist and Anglican churches. In Grand Bay the services have been conducted by the Rev. W. M. Townshend, of St. Columba, Presbyterian, Rev. Jabez M. Rice, Methodist, and Rev. Clifford T. Clark, Baptist, the services being held alternately in the Baptist and Presbyterian churches of Grand Bay and largely attended every Sunday afternoon and on Tuesday evenings throughout the winter. For more than two years the people of South Bay have been ministered to by the aforementioned clergymen and the Rev. W. P. Dunham, of the Church of the Good Shepherd.

At Grand Bay there is a flourishing Sunday school and an active Christian Endeavor society. In the summer months students from eight Presbyterian or Baptist theological colleges take the services. Wallace Forgy, of Acadia, a Baptist, will be in charge this season.

Fairville clergymen during the Lenten season are holding united services. St. Columba Presbyterian church is the head for the services this week. On Tuesday evening the Rev. Jabez M. Rice, Methodist, presided at the service, which was addressed by the Rev. William M. Townshend, Presbyterian. Rev. Clifford T. Clark, Baptist, was not present as he was holding mid-week services at Grand Bay.
