# WILL FOLLOW CANADA.

Australia is Stirred to Patriotism by Naval Policy.

London, Sept. 26.—(C.A.P. Cable).—A special despatch to The Daily Mail yesterday states that Borden's speech at Toronto and reports that Canada intends to offer three super-dreadnoughts as an emergency contingent to the Imperial navy, have aroused much attention of Australia and Australians realizing they must no longer lean on Great Britain, but must stand on an equal footing and shoulder with the Mother Country and other dominions in the defense of the whole Empire. There is a genuine dread of the growth of Japanese influence in the Pacific, and though little is said on the subject the feeling is strong that Australia should prove her readiness to play her part with New Zealand and the United States in policing the Pacific.

Australia are willing to bear taxation for these purposes. The smoldering embers of patriotism which led Australians to flock to the Boer war have again recently been fanned into a fierce flame.

Premier Fisher, interviewed, said the opinion was undoubtedly consolidating on the question of naval defence, for which a common Imperial scheme it was essential that Australia must be left to develop her own defence unit.

It seems the advantages of the existence of an Imperial defence council of dominion representatives, who would sooner or later get out of touch with the thought of the peoples represented and become only dead channels through which the policy of governments would imperfectly come from. I believe a better plan would be to hold biennial personal consultations with the British military and naval authorities in the same manner as was done last year. That would keep life in a common scheme of Imperial defence.

New Zealand's interests are irrevocably bound up with Australia. I believe it is now recognized by the best thinkers that New Zealand will eventually join in one Australian unit for defence. I think it marvelous that the cadet scheme for military training of all boys has been established with so little friction. The people now regard it as a national necessity and an individual responsibility which each must shoulder.

There the students rallied and returned. The mayor summoned the chief of police and the town fire brigade. The students divided their forces and by a rear attack drove the firemen before them and captured the town hall. By this time hostilities had continued for two hours and both "armies" agreed to peace terms.

London, Sept. 26.—M. Turner, agent-general for British Columbia, writes The Westminster Gazette denying a previous correspondence's assertion that western men are free traders. "I am quite confident," says Mr. Turner, "there are few, if any, free traders in British Columbia. The workmen are practically all protectionists. I know this well, from many elections I've run there."

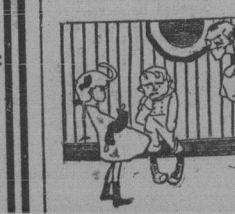
Turner incidentally asserts the cost of living in western Canada is little, if any, higher than in England.
