SECOND EDITION. THE CROPS IN BRITAIN.

FAVORABLE REPORT FROM ALL SECTIONS.

London, July 6.—The Herald's European edition publishes a summary of a canvass made throughout the United Kingdom, into the crop prospects for the present year, which is quite favorable. The condition of the crops in the farming districts of England is very fully and is also very cheerful. Reports from Ireland are also gratifying and the crop prospects in Scotland were more than usually favorable until the drought set in but even in Scotland the farmers have not given up the battle. The outlook in districts bordering on the Surrey hills is satisfactory and the harvest on the South Thames promises to be much better than the usual average. In the Cornish, Berks and Lincolnshire, but a good harvest is expected in the West Midlands. The grain crops are about average. The fruit prospects are not so good. An unusually large harvest is looked for in North Devon.

DELEGATE ELY.

How the Administration on Delegation Matters Will be Appointed.

London, July 6.—The Times' London dispatch says that Prime Minister Debatore and the Minister of Colonies, Debatore, are with the Minister of Foreign Affairs to submit the Delegation Bill question to arbitration. The proposition is that there shall be two arbitrators on each side, the four to elect the fifth, to act in the capacity of umpire; falling in which the high court to elect the umpire.

St. Louis, Mo., July 6.—Charles Egan's wreck of a steamer, the "Hesperus," on Tuesday night, July 4, has been raised and will be ready to sail for New York on Monday.

DISASTROUS COLLISION.

Cambridge, July 6.—The encounter that occurred near Angulo, between the Egyptian ironclad Col. Wodehouse and the Turkish vessel, resulted in the destruction of the latter. Three hundred others have either been killed or prisoners or deserted.

RUSSIAN AND FRENCH INTERVIEW.

Brussels, July 6.—Kees Zetting, assistant to the Russian and French War Minister, has been interviewed by the press. He has stated that the two ministers held a conference at Vicks. The same journal also states that the Car has proposed against the Roumanian government, which is to be completed in a few days.

NEW VICTIM FOUND.
